Pastor's Notes Advancing God's Love and Justice

Greetings Friends,

The reality is beginning to set in that social distancing is going to last longer than any

of us want it to. We are all eager to get back to "normal," but from where I sit, it appears as though we're experiencing one of those turning points in life where a new normal is under construction.

What will life be like beyond the quarantine? Will we become permanently concerned about handshaking and hugging? Will we become permanently anxious about disinfecting surfaces? Will we have learned skills with video conferencing and telecommuting that we'll prefer working from home? What about church? Are we interested in continuing live streaming #beyondcorona? We have several people tuning in to our worship services who can't physically join us, even if it were an option, either because they're too fragile physically, or because they live out of state. If we were to do this long-term, how might it affect our in-person attendance?

We have a number of folks in our congregation who have been deemed "nonessential" by the powers that be. It hurts economically, of course, but how does it affect the psyche? Does this time give us all pause, to think more intentionally about what we consider to be "essential" to our lives? The last several decades have seen enormous increases in personal wealth in the United States. Think about your grandparents. What would they have considered "essential"?

For many of us, these questions raise some anxieties. But I encourage you to think about this time not as something we're being forced to endure, but as an opportunity to clarify our vision, to reexamine some of our choices in life. When family are the only ones we can physically touch, how does that impact our choices in regard to our family situations? Does that raise the tension, or raise the amount of grace we extend each other? When we can't leave town for vacations because everything is closed, does this make us more aware of the family down the block who never goes on vacations, either because they don't have paid time off from their job, or because they could never afford to travel? Most of us will be getting a stimulus check from the government. For some, it'll be a drop in the bucket compared to what we need to cover rent or mortgage, utilities, or groceries. But for others, it'll be another opportunity to make a choice. Do we save it? Share it? Spend it? With whom do we share it, or where do we spend it?

Each of us only lives once, so far as we know. We should live our lives on purpose. We should make choices with our time, our attention, our money, that actually illustrate our values. Being forced into a new normal can be an opportunity for selfreflection that may just lead to important growth.

PADS Update

For more than 30 years, our church has been the site of a Wednesday night PADS shelter for the homeless. We've provided spaces to sleep, hot suppers and breakfasts, a place to shower and supplied socks and underwear. For the first time we're suspending those services until the end of April. DuPage PADS recognizes the threats of Covid-19 and closed our shelter and, as of right now, is moving all their clients to hotel rooms.

It is important to note that this is just a suspension of our shelter status. Ours is a social action church, we are a bunch of doers! We are active in everything from offering prayers to supplying food to the homeless in Chicago to mission trips to Guatemala. The PADS Team thanks the 60+ congregation members who make our shelter happen! And to thank the entire congregation for contributing funds making the shelter effort possible.

Please pray for the homeless in DuPage County. We hope to be helping them again in May!

Lisle Township Job Club

For those who may be dealing with job loss as a result of Covid-19 or who are already in job search and looking for new ways to connect and find support for their transition as we shelter in place, please join the Lisle Township Job Club.

Typically, the Lisle Township Job Club meets every Wednesday at the Career & Networking Center (C&NC) in Naperville. People are still interviewing--virtually-which makes virtual Job Club a great place to hone your virtual skills and professional presentation.

We start promptly at 11:00 a.m., barring any technical glitches that can happen despite our best efforts - which we will push through with patience and good humor. We encourage you to join through both video and audio as that's how virtual interviews and meetings often work, but you can join us through just audio if you prefer.

For the virtual Job Club meetings and any video interaction, please be aware and follow these recommendations:

* Sign on early and test the software in case you need to download an application or have trouble connecting or experience WiFi complications.

* Ensure that you won't be interrupted, either by locking the door or by alerting others that you can't be disturbed (a note on the door of the room as well as the door to the outside may be helpful).

* Check that your webcam is working. Position camera at eye level, not up your nose. Look into the camera.

* Check that your audio is working. Close any windows, tabs or applications on your computer that you're not using.

* Check your internet connection and make sure you're not downloading anything in the background.

* Set your phone to silent.

* Check that the background behind you is neutral and free from clutter.

* Adjust the lights in the room. If things appear dark or dim, you may want to bring in an extra desk lamp to brighten the space. Be front-lit not back-lit—don't sit in front of a window, for example.

* Be dressed appropriately.

* Don't move around a lot.

* Smile!

* Sign in with both your first and last name

* When you want to speak, click on "raise my hand," when done "lower my hand." Also, be sure to un-mute your mic!

* Be prepared to send me name, email address, target position(s) by 3:00 p.m., and I will send out to the group in place of our usual sign-in sheet


