Pastor's Notes

Advancing God's Love and Justice

Greetings Friends,

The world keeps turning, even amidst the coronavirus pandemic.

As you may have seen in other announcements, the Missions and Social Action Ministry is cohosting an event on the Fair Tax proposal this Sunday afternoon with ACE (Act. Connect. Engage.) and the Community Renewal Society. It will be at 2:30 p.m. over Zoom. (Please <u>click here</u> to register.) You may know ACE, the organization Beverly George and others set up a couple of years

ago to help local folks on issues of political, economic, and social interest. The

Community Renewal Society (CRS) is an organization founded in Chicago by Congregational churches in 1882. They are dedicated to social justice advocacy in Illinois, and I am glad to get a chance like this to help First Congregational Naperville get to know them a bit better. Amongst us we have differing opinions, of course, on Governor Pritzker's plan to change the state's income tax structure from a flat tax to a progressive, income-based tax. We are cosponsoring this conversation for a few reasons, first of all, to help us understand it better before we vote on it in November. There will be opportunities to both learn and ask

questions on Sunday afternoon. In this era of rapidly flying rumors and fake news, we all

need to seek out good information from reliable sources. CRS does have their perspective

on this, but whether or not you agree with their conclusions, I would trust their information to be accurate. Secondly, we are inviting this conversation because it's critical for all of us to reflect on the justice implications of this. All budgets - whether personal, congregational, or governmental - are moral documents. How and where we gather income, and how and where we spend it, have moral implications. Who benefits, and who suffers? Who is helped, and who is hurt? As Christians, we want to know how the least of our fellow citizens might be affected. If we want to love our neighbors as we would ourselves, these issues have a serious impact on the welfare of our neighbors. And it's not just about how much we pay into the system through taxes, but also about how taxing impacts the

condition of the state's financial health, and the services the people of our state need. So I encourage you all to set aside some time Sunday afternoon to join us. It should take about an hour to an hour and a half, depending on questions. I pray that we all might take this, and every voting decision, seriously and prayerfully. And I am grateful for conversations like this where we might benefit from collective conversation and deliberation.

VCR and DVD players, video game consoles, cable and converter boxes, satellite receivers, electronic keyboards, mice, portable music players, holiday string lights, wire,




